Widely recycled

Whoopie! ...chances are you can recycle this item. This symbol is used for packaging that is collected by 75% or more councils in the UK.

The Green Dot

This symbol signifies that the producer of the item has made a financial contribution towards recovering and recycling it. It doesn't give any indication as to whether your council recycles it, or even if it's recycled in the UK.

Glass

This symbol encourages you to recycle your glass container. Dispose of glass via a bottle bank

Tidyman

This fellow is to remind you to be a good citizen and not litter. He was created by the 'Keep Britain Tidy' campaign back in the 1960s.

Widely recycled at recycling centres

Although your item is recyclable, you can't put it in your home recycling bin. You'll need to take it to your local recycling centre. An example of this is a metal paint can.

Mobius Loop

This indicates that the item is capable of being recycled — somewhere. But that 'somewhere' may not even be in the UK. Like the Green Dot, this symbol doesn't give much away.

Recyclable aluminium

Your product is made from recyclable aluminium.
All councils collect food and drink ans from households, and nearly all collect aerosols and food trays

Forest Stewardship Council (FSC)

This identifies that your paper, card, or wood-based product comes from well managed forests. These forests are independently certified by FSC.
