<b>Overview</b>	<p><b>What is Red Nose Day?</b>            Since its launch in 1988, Red Nose Day has become something of a British institution. It's the day, every two years, when people across the land can get together and raise money at home, school and work. There's a fantastic night of TV on the BBC, with comedy and entertainment to inspire the nation to give generously. Comic Relief spends the money raised by Red Nose Day to help people living tough lives across the UK and internationally.</p> <p><b>Comic Relief Legacy</b>            As well as fundraising, Comic Relief also help to raise awareness around some important issues where they work with others to have the biggest impact in creating lasting change.</p> <p><b>Rights for disabled people</b>            They were the first major grant-maker to focus on supporting disabled people to speak for themselves. Their work to address this contributed to a huge change in government policy (1995 Disability Discrimination Act) and a new set of long-overdue rights for disabled people in the UK.</p> <p><b>Elder abuse</b>            Together with the Department of Health, they funded the first ever elder abuse prevalence study, contributing to the government implementing new procedures to protect older people. They also worked with the BBC to make a drama called 'Dad', highlighting the issue.</p> <p><b>National Domestic Violence Helpline</b>            There used to be no 24/7, year-round helpline, dedicated to domestic violence, so they got together with other charities to make sure there was.</p> <p><b>Time to Change</b>            Mental Health has been a priority for Comic Relief's funding in the UK for over ten years and they have invested in therapeutic services, services for young people, campaigning and policy change work, anti-stigma and discrimination work and maternal mental health. For years now, they have been working with Mind and Rethink Mental Illness to tackle the stigma surrounding mental health issues. It's had a massive effect. In 2013 they funded an awareness-raising campaign around maternal mental health. It led to a government pledge that's improved countless lives in the UK.</p> <p><b>Fighting for gender equality</b>            Comic Relief has been funding work tackling gender-based violence and supporting women and girl's activism globally since they began. In the UK they have supported community organisations delivering vital services like the National Domestic Violence Helpline and supported organisations working together to create big changes, like the Refugee Women's Charter.</p> <p><b>Providing safe places to live</b>            Comic Relief has been funding work around safe and secure shelter for marginalised communities for over 25 years. They have supported essential services to support people who are homeless across the UK. <b>Activity Two</b>	<b>Flood and Coastal Risk Management</b>							
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<b>Overview</b>	<p><b>Local Risk</b></p> <p>Many homes in England are at risk of flooding. South Tyneside Council recognises the importance of planning and managing flood risk to reduce the impact it has on our community. Flooding can have a devastating effect on both residents and businesses alike, and although we may not be able to prevent flooding altogether, it is envisaged that this strategy will coordinate our services so that flood risk is reduced and the aftermath of flooding incidents is minimised.</p> <p>You can help to protect yourself, your home and your community by taking three simple steps:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. check your postcode and find out if you are at risk of flooding</li> <li>2. sign-up for free flood warnings</li> <li>3. view and save the three point flood plan so you know how to <b>Prepare. Act. Survive in a flood</b></li> </ol> <p>South Tyneside's strategy reflects the content of the National Flood and Coastal Erosion Risk Management Strategy and includes a 5-year action plan that details the significant actions needed to reduce the risk to the borough.</p> <p>South Tyneside has a long history of flood risk, with some areas suffering more frequently than others. Some areas have suffered the effects of long, persistent rainfall events, whereas for others it has been shorter but heavier extreme storm events. We have witnessed these latter events, more frequently, in recent years. Flooding is usually the result of excess surface water and local watercourses, such as burns and small rivers, that run close to residential areas, reaching capacity and over-flowing.</p> <p><b>Environment Agency (EA)</b></p> <p>The Environment Agency is a non-departmental Public Body responsible to the Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs. It was established to protect and improve the environment and to contribute to sustainable development by implementing UK government policies.</p> <p>The EA is responsible for main rivers and coastal flooding. Its functions include implementing flood defence schemes and working with Lead Local Flood Authorities and communities to respond to area priorities.</p> <p>Amongst many other responsibilities, the EA is also responsible for issuing flood warnings for fluvial (river) and coastal flood risk and responding to flood incidents as a result of main river or coastal flooding. The EA also administer funding for flood and coastal erosion risk projects and maintenance on behalf of DEFRA.</p>

<b>Activity Three</b>	<b>National Child Exploitation Awareness Day 2020 #CEADay20</b>							
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<b>Overview</b>	<p>Child sexual exploitation is a form of sexual abuse that involves the manipulation or coercion of young people under the age of 18 into sexual activity.</p> <p>Councillors in South Tyneside are encouraging people to lend a hand to a national campaign aimed at spotting and speaking out against child sexual exploitation.</p> <p>To mark the national awareness day on the 18th March, people are being urged to support the Helping Hands campaign by writing a message on their hands and posting it on social media with the message #HelpingHands and #CSEDay20</p> <p>Councillor Moira Smith, Lead Member for Children, Young People and Families, said: "Child sexual exploitation is completely indefensible and we take a zero tolerance approach to anyone who commits this abhorrent crime. "It is important that we support this campaign to inform, educate and prevent this form of child abuse."</p> <p>Working in partnership the Local Safeguarding Children Board and the Youth Justice Service are distributing burgundy ribbons across the Borough to raise the issue of child sexual exploitation and encourage open and honest discussion about the issue.</p> <p>Councillor Nancy Maxwell, Lead Member for Area Management and Community Safety, added: "We are committed to working with our partners to keep young people safe. 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<b>Overview</b>	<p>You may be aware that the number of reported COVID-19 cases confirmed as positive is increasing in the UK.</p> <p><b>What is COVID-19?</b>            COVID-19 is a new illness that can affect your lungs and airways and it caused by a virus called coronavirus. The symptoms you may experience are; a cough, a high temperature and shortness of breath. These symptoms are similar to other illnesses such as the common cold or flu and may not mean that you have contracted COVID-19.</p> <p><b>Key Facts</b>            NHS 111 has an online coronavirus service that can tell you if you need medical help and advise you what to do.            Do not attend your doctors surgery, hospital or walk in centre if you think you may have coronavirus. Call your doctors surgery or NHS 111.            If there's a chance you could have coronavirus you may be asked to stay away from other people (self-isolate). This means you should:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• stay at home</li> <li>• not go to work, school or public places</li> <li>• not use public transport or taxis</li> <li>• ask friends, family or delivery services to do errands for you</li> <li>• try to avoid visitors to your home - it's okay for friends, family or delivery drivers to drop off food</li> </ul> <p><b>Do</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>✓ wash your hands with soap and water often – do this for at least 20 seconds.
