














Councillor Tracey Dixon, Leader of the Council

This consultation is easy to do online or you can complete the paper version inside and return free of charge by folding and popping in your nearest post box, so please take the time to have your say.



In addition, more specific service consultations allow your views to really shape provision like the recent culture strategy consultation or the adult social care survey on page 25.

When we consulted on the culture strategy earlier this year, we took immediate action where we could. Our free summer events programme was expanded into the heart of local communities to take place in parks across the entire borough. The revised overarching strategy is still being developed and will be implemented in due course.

Our Community Area Forums and area-based consultations give you the chance to influence more things in your area. Your ward councillors are here to represent you and understand issues in the area to which they are elected.

They can make enquiries on your behalf if you feel unable to make them directly or are unsure where to direct your questions.

The Council's partnership approach means that we work with other stakeholders to influence big issues such as reducing health inequalities or taking joint measure to tackle antisocial behaviour. Making your voice heard means that you can shape what the Council does as well as helping us influence the priorities of other public sector organisations.

Your feedback is important to us. Whatever avenue you choose, in-person, telephone, web or social media, you can get involved and influence decision making, it is important that we work together to deliver a shared vision and priorities for South Tyneside.

Together we can make a difference

We can all play a role in tackling climate change and making a difference. Here's some small changes you and your family can make.

Top up your fitness

Cars produce a lot of emissions which increase air pollution. Most car trips in the UK are relatively short – under 5 miles. Instead of driving on the school run, to shops or to go out with friends, top up your fitness and walk or cycle instead. Too tired? Hop on public transport.

Cycling boosts your energy levels and reduces fatigue, and improves brain function and productivity.

Try something new

Meat and dairy production is responsible for 14% of green-house gas emission emissions. Evidence suggests too much meat is not good for our health. The next time you are out and about, why not consider a swap and try a vegetarian or plant-based option.

One small step for us, one giant step for mankind

Social scientists have found that when one person makes a sustainability-oriented decision, other people do too. If we recycle waste, others in our home are likely to recycle too. Research has also shown that households are more likely to invest in much more significant change such as installing solar panels for the home, where the neighbours already have them.

What small step could you make?

Save energy at home

even though a lot of our electricity now comes from renewables, the UK still powers up on a lot of climate-wrecking gas. So an energy-guzzling home is bad for the climate as well as your pocket.

Turning off lights and unplugging appliances will help, but your heating could be undoing all your good work. Make a dent in your carbon emissions by properly insulating your home. There are more eco-friendly heating options too, like smart controls and heat pumps.







SUSTAINABLE SOUTH TYNESIDE

South Tyneside Council declared a climate change emergency on 18 July 2019 and have prioritised strategies that will bring about real change.

We aim to:

- make the Council carbon neutral by 2030
- move to cleaner, greener, renewable sources of energy
- enhance our natural environment

'Sustainable South Tyneside 2020-2025' is the Council's climate change strategy and five-year action plan, which covers 11 key themes to bring about carbon neutrality for the Council. Lots of exciting changes are happening in South Tyneside! We hope every resident can play a part.

Schools join Council to combat climate change

We have produced a climate change toolkit to support young people

It contains practical advice and guidance to teach children about the causes of climate change and the actions that can be taken to create a more sustainable future. The kit identifies opportunities to drive down carbon emissions while enhancing the school's natural environment.

Every school in the Borough has received the toolkit, which will help schools and pupils to take steps towards a greener, cleaner future.

Holborn Renewable Energy Scheme

The Holborn Renewable Energy Network project is the Council's most ambitious energy scheme to date.

It will generate renewable energy by using heat from abandoned flooded mines and from the River Tyne.

The network aims to provide renewable energy to Council-owned and other public sector buildings in South Shields.

The scheme will use a combination of technologies:

- Solar panels, both floating and mounted on an energy centre to provide much of the electricity to power water sourced heat pumps.
- Heat pumps to extract heat from water taken from abandoned flooded mines and the River Tyne, converting it into energy in the form of hot water, to heat buildings in a network of insulated pipes.
- Gas produced from wood and green waste will also be converted into 100 percent renewable fuel for the energy centre.


Summer 2021 to Spring 2022:

- Drilling on-site from 12 July 2021.
- Two 750 millimetre diameter boreholes Drilled into the ground to a depth of over 280 metres
- Pumps installed underground to extract water from abandoned flooded mines
- Wells constructed
- Mine water tested

The scheme is part of the Council's community priority to invest in our natural and built environment.

Repurposing brownfield sites to support sustainability

Jarrow Viking Energy Network

A water source heat pump will:

- 1. Extract heat from the water
- 2. Compress it to increase the temperature
- 3. Then convert it into useful energy in the form of hot water

A network of insulated pipes will distribute the hot water to the various buildings. The heat from the river will be distributed to local Council and community buildings.



Hebburn Minewater update



Boreholes on site

The Hebburn mine water project is well underway and will provide renewable heat to public sector buildings in Hebburn by collecting mine water from Hebburn Colliery.

Two boreholes have been drilled into the ground and pumps will be used to get water from disused flooded mines. The water will go into an energy centre to provide buildings with heat. The project is one of the first of its kind in the UK. The project is expected to reduce 319 tonnes of CO2 each year, and help towards our goal of becoming carbon neutral by 2030. Access to houses, apartments and shops will be available at all times.

The drilling works are expected to be complete before the end of 2021 and the scheme is due to be completed in June 2023.

Our Vision for South Tyneside

Over recent years, the Council and local partners set out a bold vision to make South Tyneside an outstanding place to live, invest and bring up families.

Our investment has included new schools and homes right across South Tyneside, investment in transport infrastructure and new leisure facilities including Jarrow Pool, Jarrow Focus, Hebburn Central, Haven Point and The Word.

The last 18 months or so has been difficult for all sectors, with retail and hospitality hit very hard in towns and high streets across the country, with significant numbers of people moving to online shopping - a lifeline for many and a trend that is here to stay.

Regeneration is about more than buildings, it is about creating and promoting a sense of place, building on the opportunities that development can bring for local people, local businesses and, as the economy recovers, to welcome back visitors to our beautiful Borough.

As we redevelop our plans, we ask residents to be there for the local shops, market and hospitality who opened for us throughout the pandemic, when conditions allowed. You can play your part by shopping locally and encouraging others to do so.

Let the talk of our towns be one of support from local people – they were there for us and now it's our turn to be there for them.

JobCentre Plus

Construction of the new purpose built JobCentre Plus building on Mile End Road is ongoing. The building is now weather-proof, work to the internal fit out continues and is on programme. JobCentre Plus is being relocated from Chapter Row, as part of the South Shields regeneration masterplan, being delivered by South Tyneside Council and Muse Developments. Work is expected to be complete and the new Job Centre open by the end of 2021.


Traditional MarketSaturdays 9am to 3pm

South Tyneside Works will provide advice, guidance and training for residents who are looking to take their first steps into the world of work, are long term unemployed or are looking to change career path. It was also offer support to young people whose job opportunities have been impacted by Covid-19.

Mandy Edwards was supported by South Tyneside Works after she became unemployed: "I worked in my previous employer for 15 years, it was a terrible shock to be made redundant. The support and information provided by South Tyneside Works was enough to build my confidence and help me find a job – I can't thank them enough!"

South Tyneside Works is a partnership led by South Tyneside Council between Skills South Tyneside, National Careers Service and Department for Work & Pensions.

Employment Advisors from Skills South Tyneside will be located within the hub to support delivery of the £2billion government Kickstart Scheme, which will enable employers in the Borough to offer six-month job placements for 180 16-24-year-olds at risk of long-term unemployment.

A spokesperson for the DWP said: "We're happy to be part of South Tyneside Works, providing young people with the tailored support they need to find work as we come out of this pandemic, and offering job opportunities through our Kickstart scheme with a vast range of local employers."

The council has welcomed proposals by Envision AESC to create the UK's first electric vehicle battery manufacturing plant.

If plans are approved, the £450m 'gigafactory' will be located on the IAMP, a joint venture between the Council and our partners at Sunderland City Council

The 9GWh-capacity Gigafactory, with state-of-the-art technology, will produce batteries to power more than 100,000 electric vehicles per year.

Subject to planning permission, Envision AESC will invest £450m as part of the transformational project, creating 750 green jobs and safeguarding 300 jobs from its existing Sunderland plant.

This will place the Borough at the centre of green industry, aligning with our climate change ambitions and our drive towards carbon neutrality by 2030.

We continue to maximise the economic opportunities to bring much needed investment and jobs to the region through IAMP and deliver on our key priorities of investing in the natural and built environment and creating the conditions for recovery and investment.

Dogger Bank Wind Farm

The Borough's 18 secondary schools are to benefit from a share in a £1million during the construction of Dogger Bank Wind Farm to prepare them for working life in a net zero world.

Project developers SSE Renewables, Equinor and Eni are developing a programme in partnership with local authorities to put science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM) at the heart of children's education.

The Council, via the Exchange business and education programme, will coordinate the initial investment of £150,000 with a two-year careers and events programme to strengthen the transition from primary to secondary education and broaden aspirations and

understanding of careers in STEM subjects. The funding will also be used to enhance careers services for school leavers. Dogger Bank will be the world's largest wind farm, located 130km off the North East Coast and will be capable of powering six million British homes.

The programme will help ensure that young people in the Borough are equipped with the skills to unlock the potential of opportunities that will be vital to the country's green economic recovery, as well as delivering on our key priorities of investing in the natural and built environment and creating the conditions for recovery and investment.

South Tyneside Council, South Tyneside Homes, and Homes England have worked together in partnership to successfully deliver South Tyneside Council's first housing development for 10 years.



The new residential development of six high quality two bedroom properties at Henderson Road in South Shields commenced in October 2020, and welcomed new tenants in September 2021.

The development of the former vacant land was delivered by South Tyneside Homes' Asset and Property Services team, who have been assisting the regeneration of the area. We hope the new tenants of Henderson Road love their new homes!

A new booking system was introduced on Monday 20 September to help reduce congestion and to support neighbouring businesses impacted at peak times.

The odd/even date is no longer in place.

Residents must now book a slot, via phone or website, to access the Recycling Village.

Four slots will be allocated to each household every month. Allowance is based on address and vehicle registration. Slots cannot be carried forward from previous months. Residents can cancel planned slots and re-book, although failure to cancel a slot which could have been allocated to another user, will mean that the household will lose one allocation.

Permits

From Monday 20 September, residents who need a permit must apply for a new one. One permit allows for 12 visits in a rolling year. You can apply for one vehicle per address. You cannot have active permits for the same vehicle registration against different names or addresses.

If you are hiring a vehicle you will not need to enter the vehicle registration. You must bring a copy of hire agreement on your scheduled visit.

If you get a new vehicle, you can update your vehicle registration on your permit. Follow the instructions on your permit confirmation email, or phone the contact centre. Don't forget! Those who need a permit will also need to book a slot to access the Recycling Village.

The 9.30am-11am will remain in place for vans needing a permit. If you are unsure if your vehicle needs a permit visit www.southtyneside.gov.uk/waste

TOP OF THE LIST 1.GLITTER

Can glitter be recycled?
Absolutely not!

If there is one thing that residents can do to help our environment this Christmas, PLEASE do NOT place ANY item with glitter into your blue recycling bin. No cards, no decorations, no wrapping paper and no pictures.



Wrapping paper is a tricky one! Yes, to brown paper without sticky tape **but** most wrapping paper cannot be recycled because it is often laminated with plastic, foil or other nonpaper materials. Some wrapping

paper is very thin and contains few good quality fibres so is not suitable for recycling. Either save and



Traditional glitter is made up of microplastics that cannot be recycled. Most glitter ends up in our oceans and back into our bodies!

The microbeads do not break down and eventually those microplastics will be consumed by some animals under the sea. This affects not only our aquatic ecosystem but also ourselves; fish that are caught for human cincreasingly beginning to contain plastic p

only our aquatic ecosystem but also ourselves; fish that are caught for human consumption are increasingly beginning to contain plastic particles, which in turn are consumed by us. Even eco glitter that dissolves in water – PLEASE put in your grey household bin.

4.CHRISTMAS DECORATIONS

NONE. No tinsel, no holly wreaths, no plastic trees, no glass baubles, no Christmas lights! Christmas lights get tangled in the recycling bin and cause huge problems at

the recycling plant. Don't forget you can donate to a charity shop if in good condition OR put in your grey household bin.

The new, more sustainable, traffic calming cushions in place in South Tyneside.

Driving towards a sustainable future

South Tyneside Council is further boosting its green credentials by exploring the use of more sustainable materials as part of its highways' maintenance programme.

New prefabricated 'one-piece' speed cushions have been installed in South Shields where existing traffic calming measures needed replacement.

The surface-mounted units with a bolt-down design, are manufactured in the UK from recycled rubber and have been fitted as an alternative to the more carbon intensive Asphalt-type material.

The new product was recently used to replace the cushions in River Drive and Bents Park Road. It is also installed in Bamburgh Avenue.

South Tyneside Council declared a climate emergency in July 2019, pledging to take all necessary steps to become a carbon neutral authority by 2030. It also set a three-year target to cut carbon emissions by 4,285 tonnes by March 2023 and is already two thirds of the way to achieving this figure.

We are always looking at innovative new ways of operating, from delivering energy improvements and carbon reduction measures in our buildings to using more sustainable products where we can.

As the Council's highway is our largest asset, it is important we review the materials and treatments we use to build and maintain our roads and footpaths and to consider new products that come onto the market.

This new product is made from recycled materials and is a more sustainable alternative to the bitumen-based cushions. It is also more durable, which helps to reduce maintenance costs in the future.

We will be looking closely at how it performs on the different road surfaces to determine whether they can be suitably used elsewhere in the Borough.





The Council is also exploring the potential use of Warm Mix Asphalt in its highways maintenance programme. This material is manufactured at a lower temperature than the currently used asphalt mixes.

The use of new sustainable products not only contributes to the Council's climate change ambitions but supports the Council to deliver on one of its key priorities of investing in the natural and built environment.

South Tyneside-based singing sensation and TikTok star Lauren Amour (@musicbyamour) is encouraging young people to get protected with a Covid-19 vaccine.

Former Jarrow School pupil Lauren, 24, regularly performed at the Customs House as a youngster, and now writes songs for stars like Joel Corry and Now United.

Her single 'Reason to Stay' reached number 1 on the Amazing Radio Charts and she has more than 30,000 social media followers.

After getting her second jab at Cleadon Park, Lauren said: "It was so easy, just in and out. I really wanted to protect myself and my family, and to see my 92-year-old gran in the safest way possible."

Lauren's live shows went on hold for the pandemic, but she's hoping to restart soon: "The vaccine means I can travel and continue my singing career. I feel safer about going back to normal and restarting gigs.

"We all need to do this together. One person can't save the world, it has to be all of us."

More than 83% of adults in South Tyneside have had at least one vaccine dose, with more than 210,000 jabs given so far.

Get your free flu vaccine

Let's face it, it's been a tough year and the last thing anyone needs now is flu.

You can protect yourself and others by getting your free flu vaccine which will reduce your risk of becoming seriously ill from the virus.

Flu can be very serious and can even kill - it spreads easily so you could be putting others at risk. Not only that but if you get flu and coronavirus at the same time, you're more likely to be more seriously ill.

The best protection - one vaccine in the arm or a nasal spray if you are under 16 - is easy to get, safe, and free for more people than ever before.

You can get a free vaccine if you:

- Are 50 and over
- Have certain health conditions
- Are pregnant
- Are in long-stay residential care
- Receive a carer's allowance, or are main carer for an older or disabled person who may be at risk if you get sick
- Are a frontline health or social care worker

The flu vaccine is also free to children and young people aged 2 – 15, and any child with a medical condition.

When you're invited for your flu vaccine, make sure you take up the offer

Stay well this winter

Winter conditions can be bad for our health, especially for people aged 65 or older, and people with long-term conditions. The cold and damp weather, ice, snow and high winds can all aggravate existing health problems and make us more vulnerable to coronavirus and other respiratory illnesses.

If you have any of the main symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) it's still important that you get tested as soon as possible. Do not wait, you need to get the test done in the first 5 days of having symptoms. You can apply for a test online via **www.nhs.uk/coronavirus**, or by calling **119**.

The flu virus strikes in winter and it can be far more serious than you think. That's why the flu jab is free for many older people including the over-50s, pregnant women and people with long-term health conditions. Under-16s can receive a free nasal spray instead of a jab.

More people are likely to get the flu this winter as few people will have built up natural immunity to it during the COVID-19 pandemic. If you get flu and COVID-19 at the same time, research shows you're more likely to be seriously ill.

Winter can bring all sorts of other seasonal bugs and illnesses, including coughs, colds and upset stomachs. Although these are unpleasant, they usually clear up in less than a week, and there's no need to visit your GP. You can get quick, expert and confidential advice from your local pharmacist and nhs. uk is an excellent website for health advice and information about where to get the right treatment.

Managing our budget

Having already made over £175million of savings since 2010 and with continued uncertainty around government funding, South Tyneside Council is working hard to protect local services and continue to deal with the Covid-19 pandemic.

Despite almost 60 per cent reductions since 2010 in the money we receive from central government, we remain committed to our vision of South Tyneside being an outstanding place to live, invest and bring up families.

Around 60 per cent of our budget on day to day services is used to support older persons and adults with physical and learning disabilities as well as protecting children and supporting families. Pressures upon these services continue to rise with an increase in both numbers supported and the level of individual need. This makes it more challenging to fund all services. However, as we plan our finances for the future we will continue to consult with residents and elected members.

You said, we did

Last year's public consultation asked residents which services or areas should be a priority for the Council. With your endorsement we:

• Continue with the regeneration of South Shields Town Centre including refurbishment work to the Riddicks building completed, new DWP building on programme to be completed before the end of 2021 and working with Tyne Coast College on proposals to relocate the South

Tyneside Campus, Marine School and student accommodation to South Shields town centre.

- Continue to work in partnership with Sunderland City Council to develop the next phase of the International Advanced Manufacturing Park.
- Progress with innovative energy schemes in Jarrow and Hebburn to extract low grade energy from underground and convert it into heating for Council buildings and local dwellings
- Work continues to progress the Holborn scheme despite the impacts of Covid-19. Procurement of a civil engineering works contractor will be completed this year.
- Continue our Borough-wide programme of improvements to highways, pavements and footpaths.

Your priorities are important to us and will continue to shape how we allocate the resources available through our financial plans.



Financial abuse, a hidden harm - Could you spot the signs?

A study into the abuse of older people in the UK found that financial abuse is the second most prevalent type of mistreatment.



- Having money or property stolen
- · Being defrauded
- Being put under pressure in relation to money or other property, and
- Having money or property misused

It also includes Theft, Fraud, Internet Scamming and Coercion in relation to a person's financial affairs or arrangements, including in connection with wills, property, inheritance, or financial transactions, or the misuse or misappropriation of property, possessions or benefits.



Financial abuse can be devastating to the victim. Did you know:

- It often occurs within a domestic setting by individuals relatively well known to the person which include family members, friends, and caregivers
- Unlike physical abuse and neglect, it is more likely to occur with the knowledge and consent of the person
- It is more difficult to detect and establish than other forms of abuse
- There is a lack of knowledge around the many forms of financial abuse
- It often involves power, control, coercion and exploitation
- People who are socially isolated or have learning difficulties may be more vulnerable
- It is under reported because people are ashamed or embarrassed

Abuse is a crime and can be reported to the police.

Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility – To do nothing is the worst thing you can do!



The Mockingbird Family Model

A new way of providing foster care.

As a foster carer, you can join a supportive community with other foster families.

It's like having a big, extended family to support you and the children you care for:

- carers can support each other to overcome problems
- young people can have more adults in their lives who care about their safety and wellbeing
- young people can form positive relationships with other people in care

By joining a Mockingbird group, you will get:

- regular social events
- sleepovers and short breaks for children
- support and mentoring from other carers

How it works

One foster home acts as a 'hub home'.

Carers in the hub home will get training from Mockingbird trainers from The Fostering Network. The hub home offers support to 6 to 10 foster homes, known as 'satellite homes'.

The families are all supported by a liaison worker from the Fostering Service at South Tyneside Council.

It can include:

- children and young people living with foster parents (foster homes)
- children living with other family members or friends (kinship homes)
- homes with adopted children (adoptive homes)
- links to young adults living independently after leaving care (independent living)
- links to birth families and other people that are important to children's wellbeing

Families will usually live near to the hub home.

Each group will have a variety of families and children's age ranges, just like a typical extended family.

The hub home also provides a neutral space for:

- shared decision-making meetings
- social worker visits
- sibling and birth family visits

How to join

Ask your fostering social worker about joining a Mockingbird group.

They can tell you more about how it works, and what it means for you and the children in your care.

- You must be committed to taking part in the hub community
- You must be an Approved Foster Carer who is committed to career development with South Tyneside
















Christmas and New Year is a time of joy and celebration for many people but can be an extremely difficult time of year for those living in fear of violence or abuse in their own homes.

Evidence suggests that domestic abuse increases over the festive season with experts pinpointing the rise to a mixture of financial and social stress. These issues, heightened by an increased level of alcohol consumption, can intensify domestic abuse and trigger violence.

Victims are encouraged to seek help and support not only during the festive season, but all year round. People are also urged to be vigilant and look out for signs of abuse in family, friends, colleagues and neighbours.

Abuse can take many forms and affects one in four women and one in six men in their lifetime. It also has more repeat victims than any other

crime and is the single most quoted reason for becoming homeless.

A non-judgmental way to approach a friend that you are worried about is to ask them if they are ok, ask them if they want to talk and let them know that you're there to help. Victims of domestic abuse often feel alone so it is important to break that sense of isolation and gain the victim's trust.

Don't forget to also think about your own safety. Find a private spot when talking to the victim and be wary of who may be listening to the conversation. Unreported domestic abuse is often due to the victim's fear of their abuser, so appreciate their privacy and ensure all information remains confidential.

If someone is using physical, sexual, emotional or financial behaviours to control the person they are in a relationship with, or an ex-partner, that's domestic abuse and it's against the law.

Safer South Tyneside

Support Officer helps veterans leaving the forces





An ex-member of the Armed Forces is supporting veterans in South Tyneside to settle back into civvy life.

Lee Moore, who served ten years in the Royal Pioneer Corp, took on the role of Armed Forces Support Officer in the midst of the coronavirus pandemic last July. Since then, he has been using his experience to help his fellow ex-military personnel adjust to leaving active service.

Lee acts as a single point of contact for all armed forces related enquiries into South Tyneside Homes, providing guidance on a range of issues, from housing and health to employment and training.

South Tyneside's dedicated supported accommodation was established by South Tyneside Homes, in partnership with South Tyneside Council in 2018. The block, in Bedford Avenue, Laygate, consists of nine spacious one and two-bedroomed furnished flats, which





are made affordable for rent to exservicemen and women as they leave the forces.

Veterans are given housing priority status by South Tyneside Homes and are signed to a tenancy with a view to move into longer term accommodation within a year. During that time, they will be offered support, advice and assistance from Lee as their first point of contact.

Lee said: "When I left the forces, I found it tough. I was given SSAFA's contact number and they were fantastic.

"My case worker, who had served, was so understanding, and I'd like to think that being ex-services myself, I can relate to and understand the issues members of the armed forces community are facing just like my case worker did with me."





Environmental and community issues

Abandoned shopping trolleys, countryside enquiry, report a dangerous structure, dog fouling, fly posting, graffiti, overhanging tree or branch, play area or skate park issue and even a public toilet issue.



Roads, pathways and street lighting

Abandoned vehicle, blocked or broken drain in the road, highway obstruction, street lighting problem, pothole, path/public right of way problem, pavement problem, traffic light fault, traffic problems and speed check issues.



Crime and disorder

Report antisocial behaviour, counterfeit goods, loan sharks and unlicensed money lenders and vandalism.

Business

Food safety concerns, report sales of age restricted products, trading standards or even a concern over a rogue trader.

Bins and rubbish

Missed bin collections, fly-tipping, litter bin problem and litter in the street.



Housing and planning

Moving out of South Tyneside, moving into or within South Tyneside, demolition notification, report an empty property, unauthorised development, land ownership enquiry or a cooling tower notification.

Darker nights

The ASB, Crime and Policing Act 2014 defines ASB as: "Conduct that has caused, or is likely to cause, harassment, alarm or distress to any person, or conduct capable of causing nuisance or annoyance to a person in relation to that person's occupation of residential premises."

The term is used to describe actions that unreasonably interfere with or could interfere with a resident's normal use and enjoyment of their home, garden or neighbourhood.

Anti-social behaviour can include a wide range of activities such as: noise nuisance, drunkenness, dealing or taking drugs, graffiti, damage to property and the environment, flytipping and harassment. Nuisance can escalate if not dealt with, and this can erode people's sense of attachment to where they live.

The Council works closely with other services including Northumbria Police, Tyne and Wear Fire and Rescue Service as well as South Tyneside Homes. Our aim is to reduce crime and the fear of crime, sharing information and taking co-ordinated action against anti-social behaviour.

If the anti-social behaviour you are experiencing is of a criminal nature it needs to be reported to Northumbria Police directly. This can be done by calling their 101 number or by using their online reporting tool.

Public Spaces Protection Orders

South Tyneside Council have approved new powers to help address anti-social behaviour across the Borough.

The new set of Public Space Protection Orders (PSPOs) came in to force on 17 May 2021 to help address anti-social behaviour-related issues.

The orders have been made following an extensive consultation exercise carried out in January.

Sergeant, David Stobbs, of Northumbria Police, said: "We know that the antisocial behaviour of a minority can have a detrimental impact on our communities, particularly vulnerable residents who can feel frightened or intimidated in their own homes.

"That's why we will continue to use all tactics at our disposal – including targeted patrols and running dedicated operations with all our partners across South Tyneside – in order to tackle pockets of disorder and ultimately keep our communities safe." The new Borough wide PSPOs will:

- Prohibit the use of motor propelled vehicles eg mini motos,trail bikes scramblers and e scooters in public spaces:
- Stop the consumption of alcohol in public spaces when requested to do so by a Police officer, a Police Community Support Officers or an authorised officer of the Council;
- Prohibit the taking of psychoactive substances in public spaces;
- Prohibit any person acting in such a way which causes, or is likely to cause, nuisance to people living in the locality, in particular, erecting tents, shouting, playing loud music, dropping and leaving litter, setting fires, urinating and defecating in the Restricted Area;
- Prohibit fishing between 10pm and 6am in the Riverside Restricted Area.

PSPOs were introduced under the Antisocial Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 and give councils and police additional powers and greater flexibility to tackle anti-social behaviour in defined geographical areas.

Anyone who breaches a PSPO risks a £100 fixed penalty notice. Failure to pay may result in criminal proceedings with a maximum penalty of £1,000. They can be enforced by the Police, Police Community Support Officers and any authorised officer of the Council.



Fly-tipping in the Spotlight

Fly-tipping is the unauthorised dumping of waste on land or in water. It can be anything from a bag of rubbish to lorry loads of waste.

The types of land most commonly affected by fly-tipping include land near to public waste tips, roadsides and private land, particularly on the outskirts of urban areas, in back alleys and on derelict land.

Why fly-tipping is a problem

The illegal disposal of waste:

- · Causes a serious hazard
- Pollutes the environment
- spoils our neighbourhoods
- A waste of council tax
- Costs local authorities alone £44million each year to clean up
- Is seen a as major problem by over three quarters of landowners and affects 67% of farmers

Please help us identify offenders!

You must always check any waste disposal companies are registered! You should always ask to see the original copy of their waste carrier's licence. By law, registered waste carriers are required to provide you with a waste transfer note; official paperwork that confirms receipt of your waste and where it is being taken to. The waste carrier can be fined up to £5,000 plus costs for failing to produce either when requested by the council.

Do not use a contractor that won't show you a waste carrier's licence or who won't provide you with a waste transfer note.

Report fly-tipping

The Council has a duty to remove fly-tipping. We can investigate and can carry out a range of enforcement actions.

All information will treat as confidential.

The person taking your call will need to know as much information as possible. Don't put yourself at risk by opening waste or by taking images/video if you do not feel safe.



MAKE SURE YOU'RE REGISTERED TO VOTE



Letters have been delivered to residents in South Tyneside to confirm who should be registered to vote at their address.



Over the past 3 weeks electoral registration staff have been calling at the homes of residents in South Tyneside who have not responded, where required, to the letters, emails, texts or telephone calls during July and August. Reminder canvass forms will be delivered to homes where no contact can be made after three attempts.



Residents are encouraged to respond to the reminder online, so we can check who is eligible to register to vote, even if there are no changes. The web address and security codes needed, and other ways to respond, are listed on the form.



Responding to the letter, or canvass form, does not automatically register new people to vote. Any new residents, not already listed on the form or letter, also need to apply to register to vote, and must give their date of birth and national insurance number when they apply.
