



International Advanced Manufacturing Park

Located on the border between South Tyneside and Sunderland, the International Advanced Manufacturing Park (IAMP) is a ten-year regeneration project on 150 hectares of land. The IAMP is designed to attract private sector investment and 7,500 jobs in advanced manufacturing in the automotive, energy, rail, aerospace, electronics and pharmaceutical sectors.

The project, a partnership between South Tyneside and Sunderland Councils, has completed its first phase and has sold all its developable land, with occupiers including manufacturing giants SNOP UK and Faltec Europe on site.

Construction of the new AESC UK £450m gigafactory for battery production is well underway. The plant, which is due to open in 2025, will create around 1000 new jobs in the area.

The Council's South Tyneside Works team continues to work with AESC UK to secure apprenticeship opportunities for our residents, including supporting funding for four Maintenance Technician apprentices following a recruitment event in April 2024.

Planning permission has been secured for the second phase of the project, which will see the widening of the A1290 through the site, and the required highways infrastructure to open-up 1.8million square feet of space for advanced manufacturing on the 'Northern Employment Area' in South Tyneside. Work on the A1290 improvements commenced in Spring 2024.



PLEDGE South Tyneside





Hitachi Construction Machinery UK, based in Hebburn, has donated 21 "ride-on toy mini diggers" to local schools, to get youngsters excited about the construction industry and deliver on the company's commitment to the South Tyneside Pledge.

The South Tyneside Pledge, which launched two years ago, encourages businesses to 'think local': to spend in, recruit from, and support the Borough.

The initiative, which almost **300 organisations have signed up to**, is having a positive impact on the economy and fostering greater collaboration between the private and voluntary sectors, between business and young people and between companies themselves. More jobs are being advertised locally and collaborations have been forged between Pledge organisations on student placements and work experience.

With a focus on local spend, the Pledge has added at least £3million to the local economy. In addition, 60 per cent of pledges are using more local suppliers and 57 per cent have hired local people. The Council has played its part by increasing its local spend from 33 to 45 per cent and regional spend from 64 to 75 per cent between 2010 and 2022.

The Pledge has also led to an increase in volunteering with 55 per cent of pledges having volunteered locally while pledge organisations have provided sponsorship and contributions towards key local initiatives.



SAND CLEANING

DID YOU KNOW

Sand on our beaches is mechanically cleaned every day by using a 'surf rake'.

You'll recognise our surf rake throughout the summer if you visit the beach. The surf rake is a piece of equipment which is towed behind a tractor and sieves the sand with a belt of steel tines which penetrate the sand, removing any debris and returning the clean sand to the beach. This is carried out every morning from 6am to 11am, or earlier if there is heavy footfall on the beaches.

Please maintain a safe distance from the machinery.

We are proud of our beaches in South Shields and we want all who visit them to have a safe and pleasant experience. Please use the litter bins provided.



SEE AND SOLVE

Our new See and Solve service, introduced last year, has been instrumental in reducing the number of people waiting to see an occupational therapist from almost 500 to 55 and has helped cut waiting times from eight months to eight weeks.

The See and Solve service sends trained assessors to visit people who may need help to live safely and independently in their home. They take basic equipment such as grab rails and bathing equipment and install them on the same day, supportive equipment that previously people had to wait a number of weeks for.

Since this innovative service was first introduced, it has been expanded to include items such as ramps and stairlifts. A 'trusted assessment' is carried out by the trained assessors which significantly speeds up the process to obtain and fit this equipment.

We know our residents want to live well in their own homes for as long as possible and our See and Solve service is there to make that a reality and provide reassurance and support for those caring for family and friends.

The service was given a **Commendation of Excellence** in the Outstanding Achievement of the Year category at the National Healthy Housing Awards 2023.

It is a flexible, paid way of working and isn't a regular job in care.


Some people move in with their Shared Lives carer, while others are regular daytime visitors. Some combine daytime and overnight visits.

JOURNEY OF IMPROVEMENT FOR CHILDREN'S SERVICES

LATEST UPDATE

Key improvements have been made in Children's Services since it was rated Inadequate by Ofsted in May 2023.

Following a positive first monitoring visit by Ofsted, a second monitoring visit was held earlier this year when inspectors noted a number of improvements across the wider service.

In their report, Inspectors highlight that improvements have been achieved at the 'front door' - which refers to the arrangements in place when Children's Services are initially contacted by a professional or member of the public concerned about a child - with children's needs now "promptly identified and responded to." This has been achieved through increased social work and manager capacity, a streamlined single point of contact and improved partnership arrangements.

The report adds that the out-of-hours service is effective, with staff making swift analysis of the risks to children, meaning children do not experience delays in receiving the right service.

The timeliness of the assessment of children's needs has also improved. Inspectors also found that there is a well-coordinated joint response from housing and children's social care when 16 and 17-year-old children present as homeless.

Inspectors also noted an improvement in collaboration with partner agencies. The introduction of a Multi-Agency Safeguarding Hub has provided opportunities for enhanced communication, information-sharing and shared decision-making for the benefit of children.

The report said:

"The new leadership team is delivering on some key objectives in their improvement path. While this visit looked specifically at the local authority's response at their front door, there also been further improvements across the wider service. In addition to the improvements outlined at the first monitoring visit, further changes have been made to include an improved early help offer, a greater willingness to learn from the sector, and continuing improvements to quality assurance."

YOUNG CARERS

66 I can't foster because of my job ??


You can still foster if you work full time. What is important is that you have the space and time to meet a child's needs.



New walkway

South Tyneside Council is supporting the National Veterans' Walk charity to create a new community-owned walkway feature in the North Marine Park in South Shields.

The walkway will be made up of personalised stones, purchased by the community, to commemorate loved ones past and present.

Once enough stones have been commissioned, the walkway will be laid, proudly displaying the names, regiment and years of service for generations to come.

Housing Transfer

In March, Cabinet made the decision to return housing services from South Tyneside Homes to direct council control following a ballot of tenants and leaseholders, in which 94% were in favour of the move.

The Regulator of Social Housing has changed the rules about the homes and services tenants can expect from landlords. They have introduced four new consumer standards: The Safety and Quality Standard; The Transparency, Influence and Accountability Standard; The Neighbourhood and Community Standard and The Tenancy Standard. The Regulator will hold all social landlords to account with regular inspections and scrutinising data on tenant satisfaction and repairs.

Having a direct relationship will result in better communication and accountability, ensuring a transparent and responsive service which involves and empowers tenants. It also means we can make better use of resources.

South Tyneside Homes was originally established in 2006 to access the government's Decent Homes Fund that councils couldn't access directly. Since then, it has brought thousands of properties up to Decent Homes standard and beyond.

It has continued to deliver excellent services, including responding to over 99 % of emergency repairs within timescale, and a 100% compliance rate for gas and electrical safety checks and fire risk assessment.

However, Decent Homes funding no longer exists and with changes to regulations and the sector facing increasing financial challenges the Council agreed it was time to look at whether it was still right to use a separate organisation to deliver housing services.

This is now the start of an exciting journey where together, we can identify areas for improvement and create a joined up, streamlined housing service fit for the future.


We aim to complete the transfer by October. Until then, services will be provided by South Tyneside Homes as normal, with work going on behind the scenes to transfer staff and services. We'll continue providing progress updates to tenants and leaseholders.

Allowing access to your home

As a landlord, we have a duty to ensure your home is safe and in good condition.

It is a requirement of your tenancy that you allow reasonable access for inspections and repairs.

We will always give you 24 hours' notice if we need to inspect your home unless there is an emergency, in which case immediate access may be required.





Housing disrepair claims

You may have seen adverts or might have even been contacted by someone calling at your home, telephoning or messaging you, promising high amounts of compensation if you have outstanding repairs in your home.

Despite what you hear, many claims are unsuccessful. Even if a claim is successful, it's likely you will get significantly less than was suggested when you signed up. Legal costs are paid by the council, from money set aside for running the housing service, and for repairs and improvements, meaning less is spent on residents and their homes.

It is worthwhile seeking independent advice before signing up to anything.

Reaping Benefits **£** for Residents

More money than ever before has been secured for residents by a team which helps people navigate the benefits system.

Our Welfare Support team offers a free, confidential welfare benefits and debt advice service to ensure residents are receiving the help they are entitled to. The team can also help people recover benefits at appeal which have been stopped by the Department of Work and Pensions.

Last year the team was tasked with maximising benefits takeup to help people through the cost-of-living crisis.


However, they smashed their target with more than £8.5 million secured in the 2023-2024 financial year - a £2million increase on the previous year.

One person who cannot praise the team enough is a 70-yearold lady from Jarrow who was struggling to manage on her basic state pension.

She had been turned down for Attendance Allowance twice but was awarded this after a Welfare Support adviser called for her case to be reconsidered. In addition, she now receives pension credit which has increased her income by almost £9,000 a year.


"The girl who worked with me was an absolute diamond. I felt I was in the gutter and she brought me out of it, she fought tooth and nail for me.

HGV Skills Bootcamps

Get skills, get experience and get the job.

A number of Skills Bootcamps have launched across South Tyneside after South Tyneside Works secured more than **£3.7 million** in Department for Education funding.

The free, flexible courses of up to 16 weeks will give residents aged 19 and over the opportunity to build up sector-specific skills with the offer of an interview with a local employer upon completion.

The Skills Bootcamps will be run in HGV Driving, including transportation of dangerous goods, and Gas Engineering and Renewables and will set you up to have a successful career in each of the sectors.

Our Skills Bootcamps in HGV Driving will help you become a qualified heavy goods vehicle (HGV) driver and get the driver Certificate of Professional Competence (CPC)

Depending on which route you take, you could become qualified to drive a 7.5 tonnes to 18 tonnes rigid lorry, 44 tones articulated lorry, or become qualified in the transportation of dangerous goods.



Residents Benefit from Multi-Million Pound Fund

Last year we were awarded £8.8 million from the UK government through the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF) which aims to 'build pride in place and increase life chances across the UK' as part of the Levelling Up agenda.

Twelve projects have launched under the banner of People and Skills to help those furthest away from the job market back into work.

The projects are aimed at changing the Borough's position as the area with the highest rate of economically inactive residents of all seven North East local authorities.

Working with a wide range of partners, the projects will offer support, training and qualifications to break down barriers to employment.

Money from the UKSPF is also funding a number of Community and Place projects. The latest of these is a third community shop which opened earlier this year in Fowler Street in South Shields. With other shops in Horsley Hill and Tyne Dock, the latest shop completes the third phase of Hospitality and Hope's three-year plan of work in partnership with us to break the cycle of reliance on food banks.

Anyone living within a mile and a half radius of the shops can become a member of the community shop

which enables them to shop
there once a week to buy goods
at greatly discounted prices.
Members pick their own items
which can include basics such as
cereal, milk, bread, pasta, rice, fresh
fruit and vegetables and toiletries.
A basket of goods worth about £20
costs only £4 at a community shop.

The community shop is open from 9.30am- 2pm on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays.

Plans are also underway to use the funding to replace the current changing facilities at Gypsies' Green which are used by athletic and cycling clubs. Work will likely take place later this year and we will work with those groups which use the facility to ensure any disruption is minimised.

Funding Boost for Culture and Creativity

Funding from the UKSPF is also being used to strengthen and support creativity in South Tyneside.

A Place Partnership grant secured from Arts Council England through the National Lottery was match funded by UK Shared Prosperity Funds. The funds will be used to help South Tyneside's Cultural Partnership to develop a programme of activity that supports local creatives to deliver ambitious projects, festivals, residencies, skills and development workshops across the Borough over the next three years.

Culture already plays a key role in enriching people's lives and boosting wellbeing in South Tyneside. With the additional support, the Council and its partners hope to nurture creativity still further, increase participation and engagement and give more people access to high quality experiences.

The funding follows South Tyneside being named one of 54 Arts Council England Priority Places in 2021. Priority Places receive support from the Arts Council for a minimum period of three years to develop new opportunities for investment.

South Tyneside's Cultural Partnership is made up of key cultural and heritage partners including South Tyneside Council, The Customs House, The Cultural Spring, Tyne and Wear Archives and Museums, Groundwork South and North Tyneside, the National Trust and many more.

Our South Tyneside Conversation

With support from Government Funding, Jarrow will receive a 10-year £20 million endowment-style fund to be spent on local people's priorities, like regenerating local high streets and town centres or securing public safety.

A Town Board made up of community representatives, employers, council, and local MP was set up. The board met in May to work together to help deliver the Long Term Plan for Jarrow.

Being a better u Champion

My name is Elaine and I am a better u Champion.

After 44 years of working full-time I decided I wanted more freedom and time to myself. The first few months were great but then I realised I was finding it difficult to adjust. I needed a new focus and a new sense of purpose.

One day I was at Cleadon Park library when one of the a better u drop-in mornings was happening. There was lots going on and everyone was very friendly. I picked up some leaflets as I wandered around. One of them was about the a better u Champions network. It had information about how to become a community champion. It looked interesting, but I hesitated, I didn't want to do something I might not enjoy or would take up too much time. After speaking to people at other drop-in sessions it started to sound more and more like what I had been looking for, so I signed up. It was one of the best decisions I have ever made!

a better u Champions choose what they want to do, how much time they give and how often. Some of us share health information with friends and family, others distribute flyers to supermarkets, pharmacies etc. Some champions help out at different health and wellbeing events, signposting to services and

chatting to people. Support is always on-hand and no one is left to feel out of their comfort zone. Champions can sign up to free training sessions on lots of health topics. You can decide if you want to attend none, some, or all of the sessions which are available.

Since becoming a better u Champion I have met lots of people, made lots of new friends and learned a great deal about the health and wellbeing services in South Tyneside. I have a new-found sense of purpose and knowing I have made a difference for others, no matter how small, gives me a sense of achievement.

Why not become abetteru Health Champion volunteer yourself? I can't think of any other volunteer opportunity that gives as much flexibility, support, training and friendship. You can start small and become more involved if and when you want to.

YOUNG HEALTHO AMBASSADORS

South Tyneside Young Health Ambassadors (STYHA) is a programme led by the South Tyneside Public Health Team. We are a group of young people from school years 9-13 with a passion for health, who want to make a difference by raising health awareness for young people in South Tyneside.

OUR CAMPAIGN!

Our campaign for 2024 focusses on mental health in young people.

During our public health training, we looked at local and national evidence around mental health and did some research into what services were available for young people in South Tyneside.

We found that although there are lots of services that can support them, young people didn't know they were there, let alone what they did or how to contact them! Added to this is the increased stigma around talking about mental health topics, making it difficult for young people to access support.

We decided to create a website, giving advice and guidance on mental health topics and encouraging everyone to talk about how they're feeling without judgement.



THE PODCAST

As part of this, we have also created our podcast - What The Health Are You Talking About!? - where we have interviewed some of the services across the Borough to showcase what they do, how to access them, and give young people an idea of what to expect from them. This will ensure that young people are able to access the right service for them, in the right way, without having the stress of worrying about what to expect. We hope that listening to real people from the services in our area will make it easier and less scary to ask for help!



Its aim is to provide new fathers with guidance on how to develop the mindset, confidence and practical skills needed to meet their babies' physical and emotional needs.

Building a strong attachment will not only enable dads to better enjoy their new role but also contribute towards positive long-term social, health and educational outcomes for their babies.

Crucially, the app also provides dads with guidance on how to support and seek help (when needed) for their partners and themselves as they adjust to their new roles, and cope with the physical and emotional strains that this can place on individuals and relationships.

The app covers topics such as:

- Feeding, holding, changing and cleaning your baby
- Surviving without sleep and coping with crying
- Getting to know your baby
- Home safety and first aid
- Looking after yourself and supporting your partner

Niagara success

A joint council and police operation to tackle youth crime and disorder in Hebburn, Jarrow and on the Metro network has led to a significant drop in reports of anti-social behaviour.

Operation Niagara has seen Community Responders from the Council equipped with bodyworn cameras targeting hotspot areas, supported with both plain clothed and uniformed police patrols.

In Hebburn town centre, this has resulted in a number of arrests - including two male teenagers suspected to be the main offenders - in connection with a string of alleged offences including robbery, burglary and criminal damage.

Since these arrests, which have included strict bail conditions not to enter certain parts of the town, there has been an **70 per cent drop in reports of anti-social behaviour**.

Nine Acceptable Behaviour Agreements have also been served to other youths in the group.

This has been followed up by visits to parents from our tenancy enforcement and youth justice teams. The operation is ongoing, and we are holding regular meetings with local businesses to keep them updated.

We've also been working with our partners to crack down on motorbike disorder, which we know is one of your top concerns.

A dedicated pilot taskforce for South Tyneside and Sunderland has already started to make its mark in the Borough.

Intelligence from local communities has been vital in the taskforce's work, and you can continue to help us by providing information in confidence about where bikes are stored and who is riding them.
