Welcome

Every year brings new challenges in local government and as 2024 draws to a close we are already looking ahead to next year and how we will deliver the best possible services for you.

In 2024 we showed steady progress in Children's Services, and this was recognised by Ofsted. Our investment in our children's care homes, now back on site, will help to expand local provision and reduce very costly out of borough placements. Similarly, major investment in adult social care accommodation right across the borough and better use of assisted technologies is helping to support people to live independently at home.

We've supported people to become financially secure, taking action to tackle poverty. We continue to help lower income families through a significantly revamped council tax reduction scheme and by raising awareness of financial support like accessing pension credits. Our Welfare Support team has secured £7.3M for residents in social security benefits and debt write-offs so far in 2024.

South Tyneside Works have supported thousands of residents back into work. Last year 7,000 people enrolled onto our skills courses. 4,800 learners developed the skills they needed to further their careers and we helped over 1,900 people into new employment.

We have been united in our efforts to improve waste services and get the collections back to normal and we want to thank all our residents for their patience while we have worked through the process.

We are still ambitious and committed to our long-term investments plans, including town centre masterplans, district energy schemes, the relocation of South Tyneside College and development of Holborn riverside, securing external funding to make things happen. We'll continue to listen to your views so that you can have your say to help shape the area you live in.

A Challenging Budget

Every year setting the Council's budget is a real challenge due to ongoing increasing cost pressures and savings that need to be made to deliver a balanced budget.

We weigh up pressures like increased demand for services, reduced central government funding, and competing commitments, priorities, and ambitions to bring forward a Medium-Term Financial Plan that is considered and agreed by Council.

As demand on services and the costs associated with them go up it leaves us with less money to spend elsewhere so we align the budget to the Borough's 20-year vision, which was directly influenced by people across South Tyneside.

Looking ahead to 2025, we can expect to make some difficult decisions. We know that nationally there are significant pressures on the public purse, and it is no different here in South Tyneside. Taking those decisions now will help us avoid even harder ones in the future.

Thankfully, we have already invested in council assets right across the Borough - the infrastructure and facilities that many of you rely so heavily on.

We have invested in leisure facilities, roads, footpaths, accessible equipment, housing stock and renewable energy schemes because we know these things matter to residents. We will continue to do everything we can to attract external funding to South Tyneside to realise our future ambitions.

We also provide support to older people, people with disabilities and looked after children in care. The cost of adults' and children's social care account for 70% of the council's discretionary budget so balancing the budget and protecting essential services is harder than ever before.

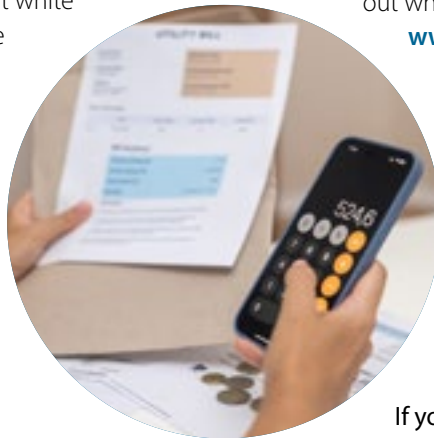

Community Shops in South Tyneside

Hospitality and Hope opened its community shop in South Shields earlier this year. It was one of ten organisations to receive funding to develop its network of community shops, providing healthy food at discounted prices in South Tyneside.

Anyone living within a mile and a half radius can become a member of the community shop which will enable them to shop there once a week to buy goods at greatly discounted prices. Members pick their own items which can include basics such as cereal, milk, bread, pasta, rice, fresh fruit and vegetables and toiletries. They receive at least 10 items for £4 at a community shop.



Opening times:

Fowler Street: Tues, Thurs & Sat: 9.30am – 2pm

Horsley Hill: Mon 9.30am – 3pm and Wed and Fri, 9.30am- 2pm

Hudson Street: Mon and Fri 9.30am – 2pm and Wed 9.30am – 3pm

The Fowler Street shop is the third community shop in the Borough, with others already established in Horsley Hill and Hudson Street in South Shields.

The shops are located within wards that have the greatest dependency on the charity's foodbank.

Let's talk about Hebburn

Our South Tyneside Conversation

Almost 1,000 local people offered their opinions in Our Hebburn Conversation and we're now using that feedback to help shape a masterplan.

Residents were invited to give their views on the future of Hebburn during the consultation.

Three areas were identified as sites for discussion:

- The town centre
- The riverside
- The wider surrounding areas

Three top themes emerged from the consultation including:

- Better shops and restaurants
- More family- friendly activities
- Improved security

You told us that your top three priorities are:

- Better security and lighting
- Anti-social behaviour
- Environmental issues such as littering and fly tipping

The Council is already working hard to address issues raised – thanks to a joint operation with police and other partners, anti-social behaviour has reduced by 80 per cent; a review of CCTV coverage in the town centre is underway; events including a family Pride picnic celebration and Christmas events have been arranged, and a project to improve the public realm is in progress, with some seating already having been replaced.

Work is nearing completion with Cultural Spring and the wider community to bring new artwork into the town centre area showing local innovation which has impacted on Hebburn's history.

Architects are now developing options for a masterplan.

Let's talk about Jarrow

A community-run Town Board - Jarrow Forward – has been formed to represent the NE32 postcode area.

Jarrow Forward was established under the Long-Term Plan for Towns, to oversee a vision for the NE32 postcode area, to create transformative opportunities for Jarrow residents. Jarrow Forward has representatives from local businesses, community and voluntary organisations, as well as local Councillors and MP for Jarrow, Kate Osborne.

Following consultation with over 30 local business and community leaders and partners, Jarrow Forward submitted its initial vision for the town to Government on August 1st.

The research highlighted how proud Jarrow residents are of their town – particularly its unique history, green spaces and friendliness – but also identified some areas where things could be better, such as opportunities for young people, for work, wellbeing and leisure.

The vision for Jarrow draws on the town's unique heritage – using its historic reputation for innovation, science, learning, industry and resilience to inspire and attract more people

and investment into the town. Look out for further wide engagement with residents, businesses and other organisations later this year.

NE32 postcode area includes South Shields AFC, Barbour, Monkton Stadium, the Viking Centre, Jarrow Focus, Jarrow Hall, St Paul's and the Bede Museum, all well connected with the pedestrian and the vehicle Tyne Tunnels, the Metro, bus station and the A19.

HOUSING SERVICES MOVE BACK INTO THE COUNCIL

On Friday 1 November 2024 the housing services provided by South Tyneside Homes will move back to be provided by South Tyneside Council.

South Tyneside Council has always been the landlord for our tenants and owned all council homes in South Tyneside, but the delivery of housing services has been carried out by South Tyneside Homes since 2006.

Ballot

Following an independent review commissioned last Autumn, all tenants and leaseholders were given the opportunity to vote in an independent ballot about the future of council housing.

94.2% of tenants and leaseholders who responded to the ballot voted in favour of council housing returning to direct Council control.

What happens next?

From late autumn you will start to see changes. Branding will change

to South Tyneside Council Housing Services across things like letters, the website, social media pages, signs and posters and vans. Our Involved Tenants Group made up of Scrutiny Panel members and Check and Challenge Group members, had a big input into how we decided on this new look and feel. While the Council starts to update everything with the new name you may see a mix of South Tyneside Homes and South Tyneside Council.

What will stay the same?

Tenants will still be able to pay rent, view their rent account, report a repair and search and bid on homes in the same way. All the same staff will continue to deliver Housing Services, but they will work directly for South Tyneside Council rather than South Tyneside Homes and their uniform will reflect this. Our call centre number of 0300 123 6633 will remain the same.

Holborn Housing Update

Construction of new housing at Holborn, South Shields, is continuing, with all 48 homes in the first phase now completed and occupied. Housebuilders Keepmoat and Cussins are both well through construction of the 95 homes within the second phase, with a number already sold and occupied.

Ground preparation for the final phase is at an advanced stage and as well as delivering a further 156 homes, this will also include a new riverside promenade, the restoration of three former dry docks for public enjoyment and ecological improvements for butterflies and marine life.



The 299-home development is programmed to complete in the first half of 2028, with 15% of the homes being either for affordable rent or a discount market sale scheme.

Our regeneration plans for South Shields town centre and riverside are all about boosting footfall, so increasing the residential population will mean more people supporting local businesses, boosting the economy and helping to create a sustainable future for the town.

Viking Energy Network Jarrow



1 YEAR ANNIVERSARY

In the first year the since the flagship renewable energy scheme became operational, Viking Energy Network at Jarrow has cut annual carbon emissions by 1,035 tonnes.

Since October 2023 the multi-million-pound network has harnessed low-grade heat from the River Tyne and exported it to council-owned buildings, including Jarrow Focus leisure centre, three residential tower blocks, Jarrow Business Centre and Jarrow Town Hall.

Water source heat pumps work by extracting heat from a body of water, compressing it to increase the temperature and then converting it into useful energy in the form of hot water in a network of insulated pipes. The solar farm provides much of the electricity to power the heat pump meaning in summer month's it operates as carbon neutral.

The scheme is the first of its kind in the UK and combines a river source heat pump, a combined heat and power (CHP) back-up system, a solar farm, and a private wire electrical network with storage battery. An energy centre has been built on the banks of the river and an extensive pipe network is used to distribute the heat across the town.

Biodiversity Net Gain and Decarbonisation

We are continuing with our plans to minimise the impact our operations have on our environment.

Our Environment Strategy places focus on nature-based solutions and ongoing enhancement of the natural environment, supporting healthy and diverse ecosystems. That's one of the reasons we are working to identify several areas across the borough as biodiversity net gain sites. These sites will provide nature-friendly developments that are good for residents, wider communities, and biodiversity.

Alongside this, a Heat Decarbonisation Strategy is being developed which will investigate potential solutions for decarbonising heating in buildings and replace the use of natural gas. We are also committed to looking at ways to reduce emissions from our vehicle fleet by reviewing emerging technologies.



Make sure you're included on the new register of electors which will be published on 1 February 2025.

Children's Services Improvement Journey

Our journey of improvement in Children's Services continues and has been recognised by inspectors during their latest visit.

At the end of July, the Council underwent a third monitoring visit by Ofsted, who noted improvements across the wider service and that the Council has continued to build on improvements since it was rated 'Inadequate' a year and a half ago.

Improvements made

Inspectors noted that children are being provided with warm and caring environments that are enabling them to flourish and make progress. Carers support children to access community activities and their interests and hobbies. Family time is encouraged and supported, and children's voices are heard in these arrangements.

Inspectors also praised social workers who work hard to form trusting relationships with children and who support child-focused decisions.

Work continues

Inspectors saw improvement in the development of an open and transparent culture; a more focused approach to corporate parenting and managerial oversight across the service.

Corporate parenting has been refreshed following consultation with children and young people. It is now more sharply focused, purposeful, and engaging with a sustained council-wide approach to corporate parenting responsibilities.

Our improvement journey continues, and overall, Ofsted noted more oversight, improved practices, and investment in the right areas. We are resolute in doing everything we can to improve services for our young people and put them at the heart of everything we do.

Investment in children's homes

Work to increase the number of residential places for South Tyneside's looked-after children is back on track.

Contractors are now back on site at Seton Avenue in South Shields where a new Assessment Centre is being built and at Grant Street in Jarrow where one of two new children's homes is being built. Another at Hebburn New Town is due to start back on site shortly. Once complete, these developments will double the number of beds in children's homes we are able to provide for looked-after children.

Councillor Liz McHugh, Lead Member for Children, Families and Social care and Education and Skills said: ***"A lack of residential places for looked-after children is an issue faced by many councils across the country. In South Tyneside we are focusing significant investment in this area.***

"We are absolutely committed to giving all our young people the best start in life. For those children who can't be with their birth family, it is important their lives remain as stable as possible, living in the place they call home, close to their family, school and friends."

As well as the residential developments, we are always looking for new foster carers.

A DAY IN THE LIFE OF FOSTER CARER KAREN

Karen has been a short-term foster carer for 11 years alongside her husband Brian. They live with their 18-year-old daughter who works at a nursery school and 11-year-old son who attends a SEND school and they are currently caring for a 7-month old baby.

Some of the fostering tasks I did today were...

Looking after all baby's needs, bottle feeding and solids, nappy changes throughout the day, lots of cuddles and communication. Filling in a daily diary for supervising social worker to read at supervision.

Some things my foster child(ren) and I did together today was...

Play, feed, cuddles and getting out for a walk.

The best part of my day was...

Getting some lovely videos to share with baby's prospective adopters and them being so happy to see them.

Something I found tough today was...

The baby is at the awkward stage where he is unable to crawl but wants to be up and about and keeps me on my toes. It can be tiring but it's also so much fun!

Since becoming a foster carer, the biggest way my days have changed is...

We have lots of appointments between my son and baby. There are lots of visits from social workers which are enjoyable as we get updates and have a nice chat. Sometimes we get lots of appointments in a short space of time, so it pays to be organised.

My number one tip for adjusting to life as a foster carer is to be organised and flexible.

Supporting People to Live Independently

Construction is underway to create a new Extra Care scheme on the former Lincoln Court site in Hebburn.

The 95-apartment housing project is being delivered in partnership with Karbon Homes and Robertson Construction and is designed to support those with additional care and support needs to live independently. Seventeen of the new homes will be specialist dementia apartments.

The project is the first of a number of sites earmarked for potential Extra Care developments in the future.

The Council is also working with Karbon Homes to develop two specialist supported housing schemes.

Ten bungalows are being created for people with autism on the site of the former Father James Walsh Centre in Hedgeley Road, Hebburn. Five bungalows and six apartments are being developed on the former Nolan Hall site in Concorde Way, Jarrow for people with complex learning disabilities. Both projects, due to be completed in the new year, will incorporate staff accommodation.

The new extra care and supported living schemes will provide much-needed accommodation for those who are most in need of additional care and support to live independently in the community.

They form part of the Council's wider Adult Social Care Accommodation Strategy and align with the Borough's Living Better Lives vision to ensure every person in South Tyneside with care and support needs are 'living better lives'.

They also help the Council to deliver on its ambition for people to stay healthy and well throughout their lives and is in direct response to residents saying they would prefer to live well independently for as long as possible, rather than go into residential care.

Restart Targeted Response

FAMILY SUPPORT IN SOUTH TYNESIDE

In the last year, thousands of families have accessed South Tyneside Family Hubs taking advantage of better integrated services from conception up to the age of 19 or 25 for those with additional needs.

The hubs provide support on parenting, early language and home learning, parent-child relationships, and infant feeding.

A range of professionals and service providers, including midwives, health visitors, early help workers and adolescent workers are located at the hubs to provide a 'one-stop-shop' so that families need only tell their story once and help can be provided at the earliest opportunity.

The network of 12 Hubs has seen over 50,000 contacts from 8,500 children, young people, parents, and carers.

We work in partnership to bring together a wide range of services including:

- free activities for children and young people
- parenting support
- relationship programmes
- infant feeding support
- weekly groups
- mental health support
- early language support

Louise Taylor, from Jarrow, is just one of the 5,224 parents and carers who has accessed the Hubs since they launched in June 2023

Louise said: "I didn't know many people when I moved to the area, and I felt isolated.

"I really struggled with anxiety, but when I started attending Bede Family Hub, I instantly felt welcomed. It's given me a sense of belonging.

"I'm now a lot more confident and the Family Hub has given me a place to socialise and make new friends.

"I've grown so much as a parent and that means that my kids are growing too. I've attended the 'HENRY' programme and that gave me the skills to help us live a healthier and happier lifestyle."

"I go to the playgroup every Monday and try to attend individual sessions too, during the holidays I'm able to take my older child and he sees the Family Hub as a safe and welcoming space.

"I'd encourage any parent or carer to give it a try and see for themselves what is on offer."

Flu is a serious condition that kills thousands and hospitalises thousands more in England each year. The flu vaccination is the best protection for you and those around you, which is why it is offered for free to those most at risk. Visit www.nhs.uk/flu vaccine to find out if you're eligible and for more information.

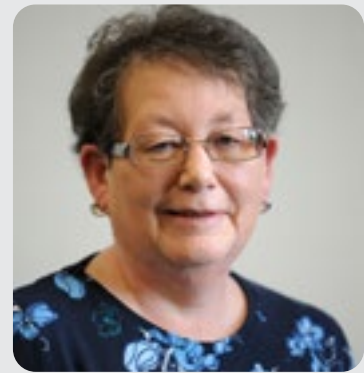
Flu can also be nasty for children and lead to more serious illnesses such as bronchitis. Children can catch and spread flu easily. Vaccinating them helps to protect others who are vulnerable to flu, such as babies and older people. The children's nasal spray flu vaccine is safe and effective.

Adults at high risk from flu are also most at risk from coronavirus, which causes Covid-19, so some people may be eligible for both the flu and the COVID-19 booster vaccines to help protect them from a double threat this winter. Vaccines are safe and effective and give you the best protection against the viruses. If you are offered both vaccines, it's safe to have them at the same time.

Ask your GP or pharmacist how to book an appointment.

There are lots of other ways you can help yourself to stay well this winter, including:

- Keep your medicines cabinet well-stocked with the basics, such as pain killers, antihistamines, cold and flu remedies, a first aid kit and phone numbers for your GP & Pharmacy.
- Stay active – no matter our fitness levels we should all try to move around every day, from chair-based exercises to going to the gym and everything in between!
- Look after your mental health – search Every Mind Matters for useful tools and tips.
- Maintain good hand and respiratory hygiene – remember 'catch it, bin it, kill it' for coughs and sneezes then wash or sanitise your hands straight

NE North East Combined Authority

UPDATE



The North East Combined Authority, made up of South Tyneside Council and the other six North East local authorities, has been working on plans to allocate £500m of funding.

Early initiatives include:

- a new Local Transport Plan with resident consultation on proposals planned for November
- establishing a £1m Mayor's Opportunity Fund – a small grants fund for community and voluntary groups to tackle local deprivation and social issues
- a £70m 'route to finance' project to support local and regional small businesses
- a regional Child Poverty Reduction Unit

The new regional Child Poverty Reduction Unit will support the wider Education, Inclusion and Skills portfolio, led by Council Leader Cllr Tracey Dixon, to reduce education inequality in schools and increase routes to employability.

The NE Combined Authority will look at how existing skills and training is matched to the jobs that are available now and what skills and training is needed for the jobs that will be available in the future. This will give employers and potential investors to the region the confidence they can access a skilled workforce for their businesses to grow and thrive.

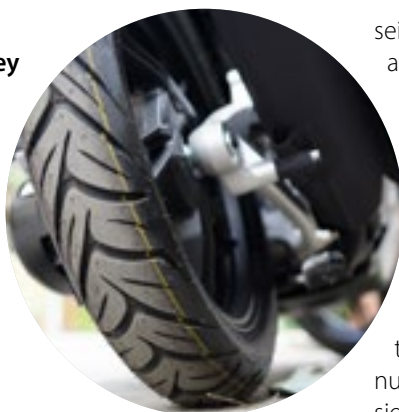

Driving Down Crime and Disorder

The Community Safety Partnership is made up of the Council, Northumbria Police, Probation Service and other organisations.

The Partnership's Plan for 2024-2027 identified five key priorities:

- reducing crime
- addressing domestic and sexual abuse
- putting victims first
- addressing anti-social behaviour (ASB)
- delivering community confidence.



Falling Levels of Crime and Anti-social Behaviour

Figures show that **overall levels of crime were down by 5%**, and **ASB decreased by 11% during April to August**, compared to the same period last year

There was a **41% reduction in vehicle crime** and a dedicated taskforce was set up to tackle motorcycle disorder which has resulted in nearly **100 bikes seized since the start of this year**.

Tackling Crime and Anti-social Behaviour

The Council and its partners have also been cracking down on nuisance tenants this year, securing four closure orders to shut down problem homes and two civil injunctions banning anti-social neighbours from certain areas. In the last month teams

seized a council property in South Shields after gaining a possession order.

The work of the environmental enforcement team, which tackles issues including fly tipping, littering and dog fouling, resulted in **25 fines being issued over a three-month period and three people taken to court**, with one flytipper jailed for eight weeks.

We know that tackling crime and anti-social behaviour is top of our residents' priorities. Teams are working hard to continue to address issues like motorcycle disorder, nuisance tenants and youth disorder - which has also seen a significant decrease on last year.

These are problems that can really impact people's quality of life, and we will continue working as a partnership to identify further areas for improvement.

WINTER ROAD MAINTENANCE

When South Tyneside's roads are in the icy grip of winter weather our winter maintenance team is out at all hours aiming to keep roads safe and ice-free.

The team maintains four priority routes which cover South Tyneside's road network. We prioritise major roads, bus routes, steep banks, priority pavements in shopping areas, around schools, and on steps and footbridges. Pre-gritting takes place on priority routes as and when the temperature drops. Gritting the Borough's 311km of priority routes takes around 2.5 hours to complete.
